

Your Vote Matters

Information for Individuals with Disabilities

The November 8th election will be one of the most important elections in over a decade.

The disability community—people with disabilities, family, members, attendants, providers, professionals, advocates and supporters—has a major stake in the outcome of this election. Under the Bill of Voting Rights, you have the right to take part in civic life. So know your rights!

REGISTERING TO VOTE

I may register to vote in Massachusetts if:

- I am a citizen of the United States and;
- I will be at least 18 years old on or before the next election and;
- I am a resident of Massachusetts and;
- I am not currently incarcerated by reason of a felony conviction.
- I may register to vote online, by mail, or inperson.
- If someone challenges my qualification or right to vote, I have the right to vote a provisional ballot.

IDENTIFICATION

I may be required to show identification when:

- I registered by mail and it is my first time voting in a federal election in Massachusetts
- I am an inactive voter or casting a provisional ballot.

Acceptable ID must include my name and address at which I'm registered to vote. Examples include: a driver's license, state-issued ID card, recent utility bill, lease, a copy of a voter registration affidavit, or any other printed identification which contains name and address.

VOTING AND ACCOMMODATIONS

If I am registered to vote, I have the right:

- To vote alone or with help.
- To vote with guardian, unless a court determines you cannot.
- To be accommodated at all polling places with assistive voting devices.
- To bring anyone I choose into the voting booth with me if I need help marking my ballot due to physical disability, inability to read or read English. Or, I may ask for help from two poll workers (by law, the poll workers assisting you should be of different political parties).
- To mark my ballot independently with the AutoMARK Voter Assist Terminal, which is available in every polling place.
- To vote if I am waiting in line when the poll closes.
- To have accessible parking.
